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Liber ad milites templi de laude novae militiae

Saint Bernard of Clairvaux is a name remembered by only a few in our world today. However, in the early days of the Knights Templar his name, as well as his quill, invoked the same fear as a Templar sword in pontiffs, Kings and Pope. He was known as the "Oracle of Europe". He was, arguably, more responsible for the success of the Knights Templar than any other man. In this edition of the Scribe we hope to shed light on Bernard, the forgotten Templar, who died on **August 20, 1153.**

In a letter written by Bernard and addressed to Hugh of de Payens, founder of the Knights Templar, prior to 1136. Bernard begins by saying to Hugh, "Not less than three times have you requested I write an exhortation of the newly formed Knights." Bernard would honor the Grand Master de Payens wishes by writing the Liber ad milites templi de laude novae militia or Book to the Knights of the Temple, in praise of the new knighthood. This letter was looked upon as a pivotal source of inspiration for the new Knights and serves notice to the world that Bernard was now on the side of the Temple Knights! This letter was especially important to the early Templars who were struggling financially and spiritually. Many were having second thoughts about the validity of the Order and/ or the justness of their cause. I do not know if it would be more appropriate to refer to them as monks or as soldiers, unless perhaps it would be better to recognize them as being both. The Templar symbol Angus Dei. This

symbol was used by Knights Templars to attest to their humbleness and the true nature of their order. It was a statement to the world that the Templar was an order that was as



meek as a Lamb, unless defending the word of Christ when they became as ferocious as a Lion.

Referring to the Templars, St. Bernard of Clairvaux coined the phrase "they are as meek as a Lamb yet as ferocious as a Lion".

The Seal of Andre de Montbard (1103

-1156), who was the 5th Grand Master of the Knights Templar. He was one of the nine founding members of the Knights Templar. He was also the



uncle of Bernard of Clairvaux and was considered the spiritual leader of the Templars.

The seal of Count Hugh of Champange. He was the highly influential and wealthy French Nobleman who was loyal to the Templars. He accompanied Hugh de Payens to the Holy Land at least twice. He



Cistercian Abbot Stephen Harding and he donated the land to build the Cistercian Monestary Clairvaux. He later relinquished his tiltes and Wealth to join the Knights Templars.

Eminent Commander 2016 James B. Steele It is hereby ordered that the North Carolina flag patch to be worn on the Class A uniform shall be as picture #1:





A patch measuring 2 ½" by 3 ½" blue field to the left, red and white field to the right with red over white. A white star centered on the blue field with "N" to the left and "C" to the right. A gold banner above "NC" inscribed with "May 20th, 1775" and a gold banner below "NC" inscribed with "April 12th, 1776" this being the flag of North Carolina. A North Carolina flag including the words "North Carolina" on the lower portion of the flag, picture #2 above, is not an accurate depiction of the North Carolina flag. While this patch shall no longer be accepted for new use its continued use on existing uniforms will in no way be considered as incorrect. All new uniforms and any uniform being judged in competition shall make use of patch #1 as described above.

Old World Knights Templars were men of legend. In their quest to defend truth and justice, these men used their swords and unwavering dedication to secure victories in epic battles burned into the pages of our history books. As modern day Knights, we pride ourselves on representing the Order, not with a sword, but as a benevolent and brotherly house whose ultimate goals are charity and the neverending search for light. We now use symbolic swords. We revel in legends which depict old world Templars being ferocious as the proverbial lions. And they were, indeed. However, there was a duality to their personalities which often goes unmentioned. They had a very complex, self-reflecting and gentile side to them-they could be as meek as a lamb.

History always repeats itself. The world of the early Templars was in many ways very different from our own modern world; but, as we are witnessing more and more, our worlds are once again becoming eerily similar. Religious extremism, the diluting of Christian morals and unprovoked violence was inflicted upon humanity by radical groups then, just as today where modern day religious extremists, atheism, and "politically correct" bureaucrats are seeking to dilute the values of our world. Sometimes I ponder that perhaps the evil ones are once again testing the resolve of the Templar- with an ancient question. Are we still as meek as a lamb and ferocious as a lion or have we become lamb chops only? Pope Eugenius was a student and friend of Bernard Of Clairvaux. He was like a son to Bernard and was said to be Bernard's own Pope. No doubt Bernard influenced this command!

A Templar was never allowed to retreat unless the Templar flag had fallen and then only after inexhaustible effort was expended to revive it.


The Living Legends Project

Looking Back:

Sir Knight James (Jim) Henry Horne



7-13-1919—6-2-2010

His Masonic career began at Creasy Proctor Lodge No.679 A.F.& A.M. He was raised May 15th, 1951 Jim was a Certified Lecture Class A from 1954 until his passing. He was exalted to the Most Sublime Degree of Royal Arch on October 8th 1959 at Phoenix Chapter No. 2. He was greeted a Select Master at Fayetteville Council No. 27 Royal and Select Masters on November 9th, 1959. He was Knighted on December 3, 1959 at Palestine Commandery No.20 and served as the Eminent Commander in 1970. Jim was a member of Signet of Zerubbabel Council No. 36 AMD and served as our Sovereign Master in 1971. He also authored the Council Degrees study book we use today.

"By the sheer force of his personality, he developed, organized, designed and sought resources to build the current Masonic Center. He left a beautiful, functional building. He left a wardrobe for every degree and order. He left us the rituals for every occasion. He until just before he died, conducted the Order of the Temple from memory to include the Knights around the Triangle, the sword lecture and especially the obligation. I was blessed to learn how he operated. It was never for selfish gain, only the love of the craft. He was to many "Mr. Mason" in Fayetteville. Palestine #20 Christmas Observance. December 8th, 2016 @ 7:00pm. This is a family event... bring your family and friends.


